Welcome to the Shire of Manjimup, there are many reasons why this is a great place to live, work and unwind.

We are delighted that you have chosen our region as your new home. The Southern Forests is a nurturing community with a diverse and stable economy, low crime rate and extensive facilities.

This booklet identifies Shire services and facilities available which may assist you in settling in and helping you find your way around the region.

The Shire provides a number of services for residents and visitors including public infrastructure, regulatory and compliance services and community services.

The Shire of Manjimup, with an area of 7,028 km², is the largest shire in the South West region of Western Australia and is part of the Warren Blackwood sub-region. With over 4,000 residents in the urban centre, the town of Manjimup is the most populated town in the Warren Blackwood sub-region.

Within the Shire there are the four main townships of Manjimup, Northcliffe, Pemberton and Walpole, and six smaller settlements of Deanmill, Jardee, Palgarup, Quinninup, Tone River and Windy Harbour. The Shire is divided into six wards and has 36 localities.

The Shire of Manjimup is a healthy place to live with fresh air, magnificent national parks and spectacular coast lines, offering nature's best for camping, bush walking, cycling, fishing or just enjoying the serenity, along with local parks and walkways which encourage exercise and family time. The coast line, inlets and fresh water lakes provide places to fish, swim, sail, water ski and camp.

The Shire is also rich in natural value with 85% of the area protected in national parks, state forests and conservation reserves. The region is famous for its karri and jarrah forests, which have supported a timber industry for over a hundred years.

With some of the oldest national parks in the state, tourism has long been an important part of the economy. Iconic national parks such as Beedelup and Warren are famous for their spectacular forests and waterways. D'Entrecasteaux National Park and the Walpole wilderness have heathland, spectacular coastlines and protected inlets as well as tall forest, including tingle trees.

With a mild mediterranean climate, reliable rainfall and arable soils, the Shire of Manjimup is renowned as a premium agricultural area, especially for potatoes, apples, fruit and vegetable crops, dairy and livestock; and more recently for premium wine, avocados, marron aquaculture, truffles and strawberries. Agriculture is the biggest industry sector in the Shire accounting for more than \$323 million of production value and utilising more than 78,500 hectares of land.



Our Towns

Manjimup

Manjimup is in the lower South West of WA, approximately 307 kilometres south of Perth and 126 kilometres from the regional city of Bunbury. The town of Manjimup is a regional centre for the largest shire in the South West of Western Australia. The 2016 population of Manjimup town site was 4,349 people, while the broader area of Manjimup consists of 5,538 which accounts for nearly 60% of the total Shire population.

Surrounded by lush pastures and some of the most productive soils in Australia, Manjimup has become known as the Food Bowl of WA. A diverse range of high quality produce surrounded by a pristine environment makes Manjimup a must on your culinary bucket list.

Named for the Noongar word “Manjin” (a broad leafed edible reed) and “Up” (meeting place), Manjimup is the main commercial centre for the Southern Forests region. It still maintains its country charm with its many Art Deco facades.

Central to the entire lower South West, Manjimup is an ideal base, it has all your major needs covered, with shopping, gyms, medical and service needs available.

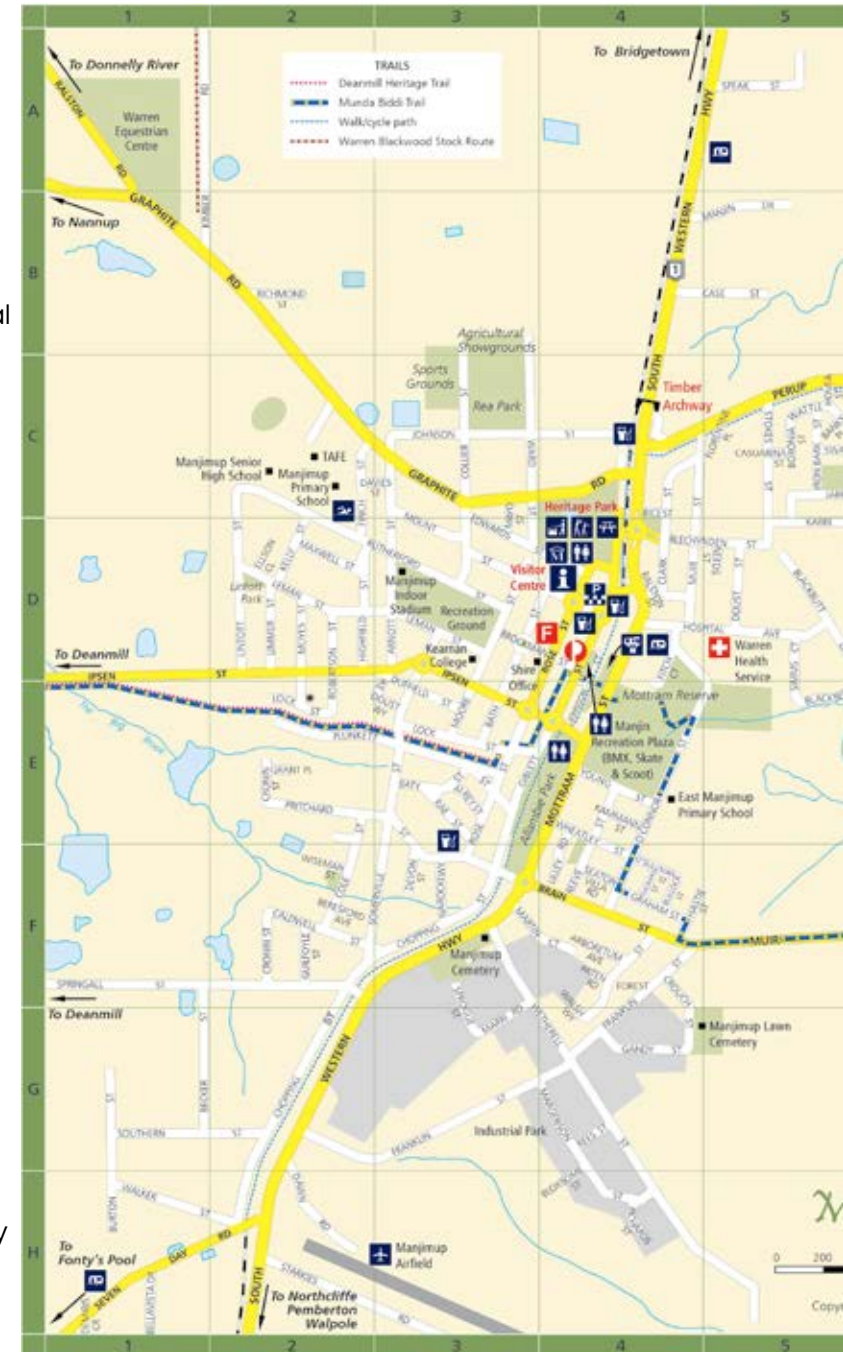
In town is the Heritage Park with its innovative kid’s playground and giant slide, the State Timber Museum, PowerUp Electricity Museum, Historic Hamlet, cafe and Tourist Centre.

The indoor AquaCentre has great facilities and is heated for year round use. There is a lush golf course just on the edge of town.

Manjimup is the centre of a thriving fruit and vegetable industry, being the proud birthplace to the delicious Pink Lady Apple and the brand new variety, Bravo. Manjimup is one of the largest producers of Black Truffle (*Tuber Melanosporum*) in the world. A truffle hunt is a must do during the season.

Each year, Manjimup is home to some of the largest events in Western Australia, the Truffle Kerfuffle, Cherry Harmony Festival, Manjimup 15,000 and Targa West Rally.

There are many natural attractions within a short drive from Manjimup, making them ideal for either day trips or to explore at your leisure.

Pemberton

Pemberton lies at the heart of the Karri forest some 31 km from Manjimup. The picturesque town nestles in a peaceful valley surrounded by mighty Karri trees and lush pastures. The area was first settled in the 1880's and the town came in to being with the establishment of the first sawmill in 1913.

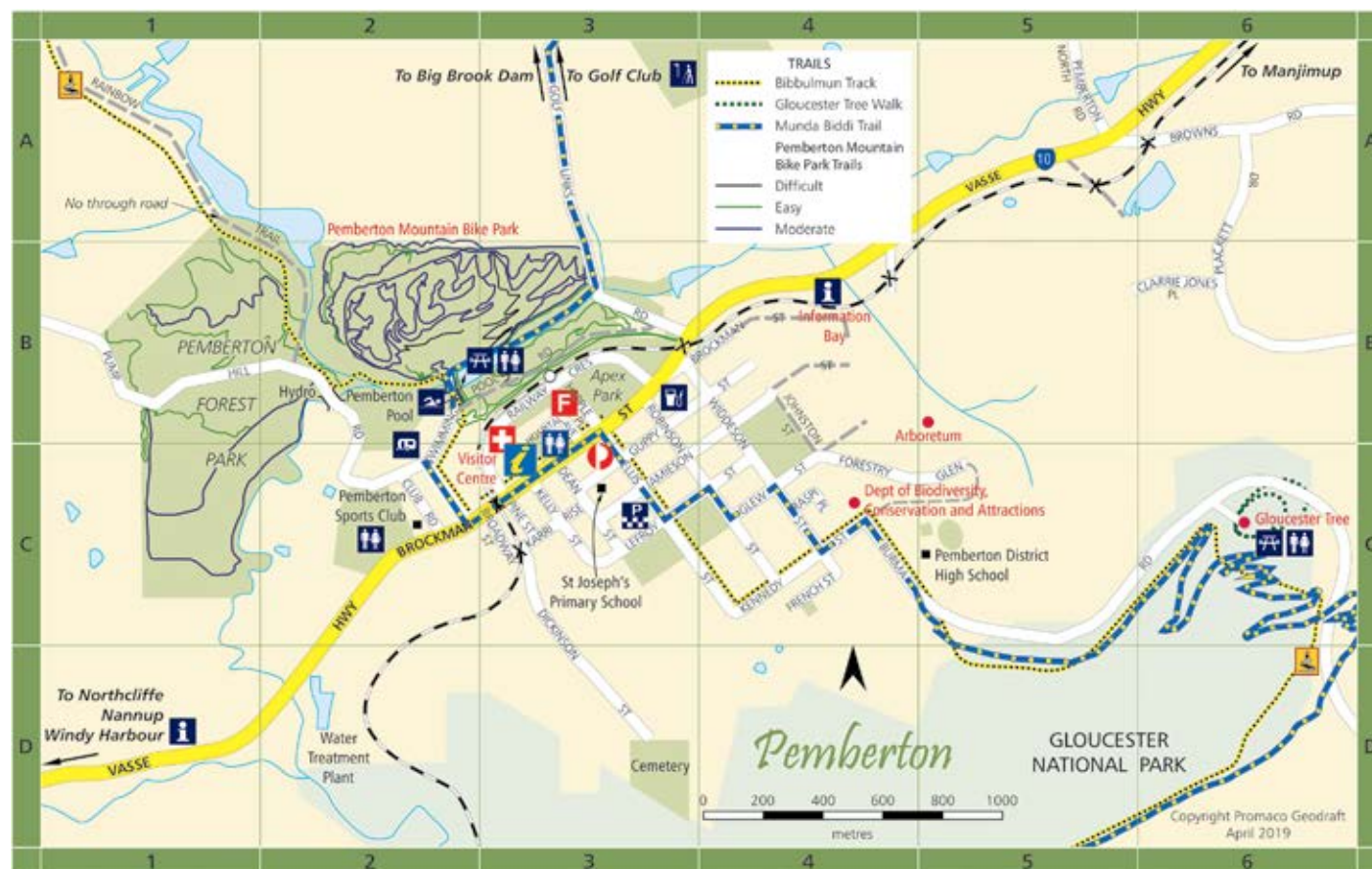
There is a lot to do and see and the forest takes on a different appeal according to the season. As well as being the centre of strong horticulture and viticulture industries, Pemberton is a renowned tourist destination.

The area was settled by Edward Brockman (who later married Capel Bussell) after an expedition to the area in 1861 with Gerald de Courcy Lefroy and Pemberton Walcott.

The area was first known as Big Brook but when the town site was declared in 1912 the name Walcott was first proposed and rejected (due to a conflict with Port Walcott near Wickham in the Pilbara) before Pemberton was accepted. The town is named after Pemberton Walcott who settled in the area in 1862, but only stayed for 2 years. Two Islands near Karratha are named after the same man.

A state saw mill was established in 1913 to supply 500,000 sleepers for the trans-Australia railway. By 1939 it was the largest milling complex in Australia.

The Pemberton region features the famous Gloucester and Bicentennial fire lookout trees and diverse national parks. Pemberton is a renowned and highly valued tourism destination with many accommodation options and attractions. Pemberton was also the location for the Australian movie Jasper Jones in 2017.

Northcliffe

Northcliffe is situated 56 km south of Manjimup - 27 km from the coast at Windy Harbour. It is the gateway to the D'Entrecasteaux and Shannon National Parks. Walk the trails of the Forest Park or the Bibbulmun Track and identify trees and plants of the karri forest. Heathland wildflowers, although in extra abundance in the spring, can be found in Northcliffe all year. The Tourist Centre abounds in history and culture. Attractions include the extensive George Gardner Rock and Mineral Collection, an Aboriginal interpretative centre featuring the Bibbulmun tribe, comprehensive photographic wildflower catalogue, group settlement museum and period schoolroom.

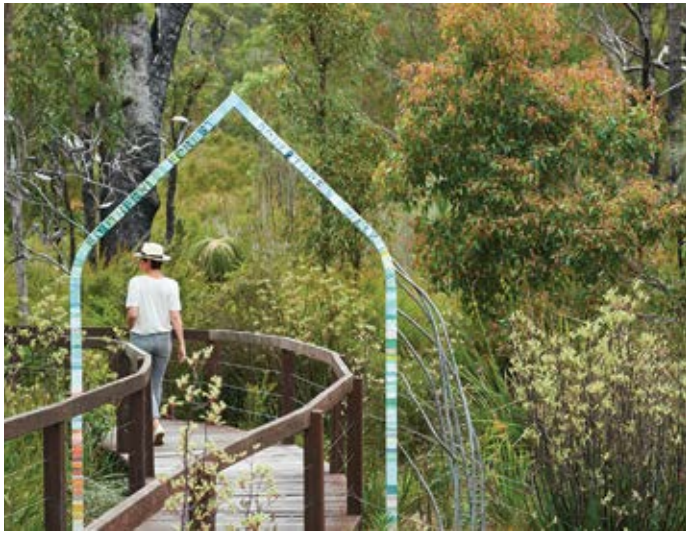
Northcliffe is surrounded by state forests, national parks and agricultural land used for dairy farming, bluegums, avocados, olives, wine grapes, beef cattle, blueberries, green tea, black and white truffle farming and more. From Northcliffe to the coast at Windy Harbour is a coastal heath plain, a wild flower wilderness which can be viewed from the top of Mount Chudalup.

Visit Northcliffe, in the South West corner of Australia, to be humbled by massive Jarrah and Marri and tall graceful Karri trees. Take in a view of vast coastal plains populated by granite expanses and islands of vegetation. Peer down from limestone cliffs and be surrounded by a sea of colour as the wildflowers bloom over Spring and Summer.

The national parks around Northcliffe feature fantastic wilderness and biodiversity and offer something for everyone. Recreation sites for visitors to explore include Boorara Tree and Lane Poole Falls, Point D'Entrecasteaux, Salmon Beach, Mount Chudalup, Shannon and Windy Harbour.

In Northcliffe you can take a scenic drive, walk on popular local walk trails, hike on the world famous Bibbulmun Track, or travel via mountain bike along the Munda Biddi Trail, running from Perth to Albany. You can go whale watching, 4 wheel driving, swimming or cast a line into the spectacular Southern Ocean.

Walpole

Walpole is located on the south coast, 120 km south of Manjimup and approximately 68 km west of Denmark. Aboriginal people first lived and moved through these parts more than 30,000 years ago. Early seafarers along the south coast of WA in 1622 were discouraged from close exploration by strong winds and the lack of visible safe anchorages. However, the sealers and whalers later spoke in glowing terms of sheltered inlets, huge trees and great deep rivers. These reports brought William Preston and his party to officially explore the Walpole-Nornalup area in 1831. In 1845 a group of Englishmen settled on the Deep River. Permanent settlement followed in 1910. The district was opened for agriculture in 1930 with the introduction of the Nornalup Land Settlement Scheme. The new township was gazetted as Nornalup in 1933 and this was officially changed to Walpole in August 1934. The area is surrounded by giant Tingle and Karri forests and is close to the world renowned Tree Top Walk.

Walpole is surrounded by the Walpole-Nornalup National Park and the Walpole-Nornalup Inlet System. There is so much to see and explore in the Walpole region - experience the vast spreading views from Mt. Frankland, the mirrored reflections in the quiet rivers, the glory of the wildflowers, the majesty of the trees and the world famous Valley of the Giants Tree Top Walk, the beauty of the inlets

and the rugged grandeur of coast and islands. There is so much to do - boating and sailing, fishing, bush walking, scenic drives and climbing. The Walpole-Nornalup region offers all standards of accommodation - luxury chalets, motels, budget accommodation, backpackers, bed and breakfast, holiday houses and caravan parks.

Our Settlements



Deanmill mill houses

Deanmill

The historic timber town of Deanmill in the South West region of Western Australia in the Shire of Manjimup, was originally one of three State-owned timber mills established after the Government *Trading Concerns Act* was passed in December of 1912.

Though initially a tent camp primarily occupied by single men, the construction of the mill by mill workers quickly created a strong sense of community among the residents of Deanmill and so, families soon followed.

Nyamup

Nyamup was established on 68 acres as a settlement for timber mill workers in 1939. It was one of a number of timber towns in the south west area. The mill is thought to have closed in 1979 and the area ceased producing timber in 1989.

Nyamup is now privately owned. There are 26 of the original buildings left, including the school and the community hall.

Mill house Jardee

Jardee

Originating as a railway siding named Jardanup which was established in 1912 during the construction of the Bridgetown to Wilgarup railway line. Jardanup was the terminus built to service the No 1 state saw mill, also built in 1912.

Jardee is now privately owned.

Quinninup

Quinninup is located 30 km south of Manjimup. The period 1910 to 1920 saw the continuation of development in the Warren district, the timber industry became firmly established and the population of the district increased further. Quinninup Group Settlement 119 consisted of 17 families who arrived in May 1924. They lived in shacks just off the Wheatley Coast Road, which was one of the stock routes used to drive cattle and sheep to the coast for summer feed. The settlement is a former timber mill site and the quaint cottages now house local residents and the area is increasing in demand as a quiet residential area around Karri Lake and among native forests.



Windy Harbour

Windy Harbour is a holiday settlement surrounded by the D'Entrecasteaux National Park about 90 km south of Manjimup. Approximately 230 cottages have been developed on individual leases since the early 1900's. After the great depression, inexpensive camping holidays on the south coast were favoured by many of the south west timber workers during the Christmas break when mills ceased to operate for several weeks. It was during these times that the strong social ties and community spirit, which still typify the Windy Harbour settlement, were first established. Fishing has always been, and still is, a major recreational activity at Windy Harbour and one of the principal reasons for establishment of the settlement. The settlement provides visitors with spectacular scenery, safe harbour on the rugged coast line and rewarding fishing.



Tone River

Built as a mill town in 1952, timber operations closed at Tone River in 1978 and the property became a wilderness camp, run by the Department of Sport and Recreation for three decades. The 39.8 ha property, which includes 20 cottages, a town hall, workshop, an old reception office, undercover barbecue area, two tennis courts and its own cricket oval, is now privately owned.

Palgarup

The Palgarup townsite is located approximately 10 kilometres north of Manjimup on the South West Highway. It is an old timber mill area and has been subdivided into residential and small acreage lots.

Fast Facts

The Shire of Manjimup is a vibrant district made up of a diverse range of towns and settlements, nestled in the booming South West region of Western Australia. Key industries in the area include agriculture, timber, tourism and public administration. This progressive community embraces change and diversity, which makes it an ideal location for investment.

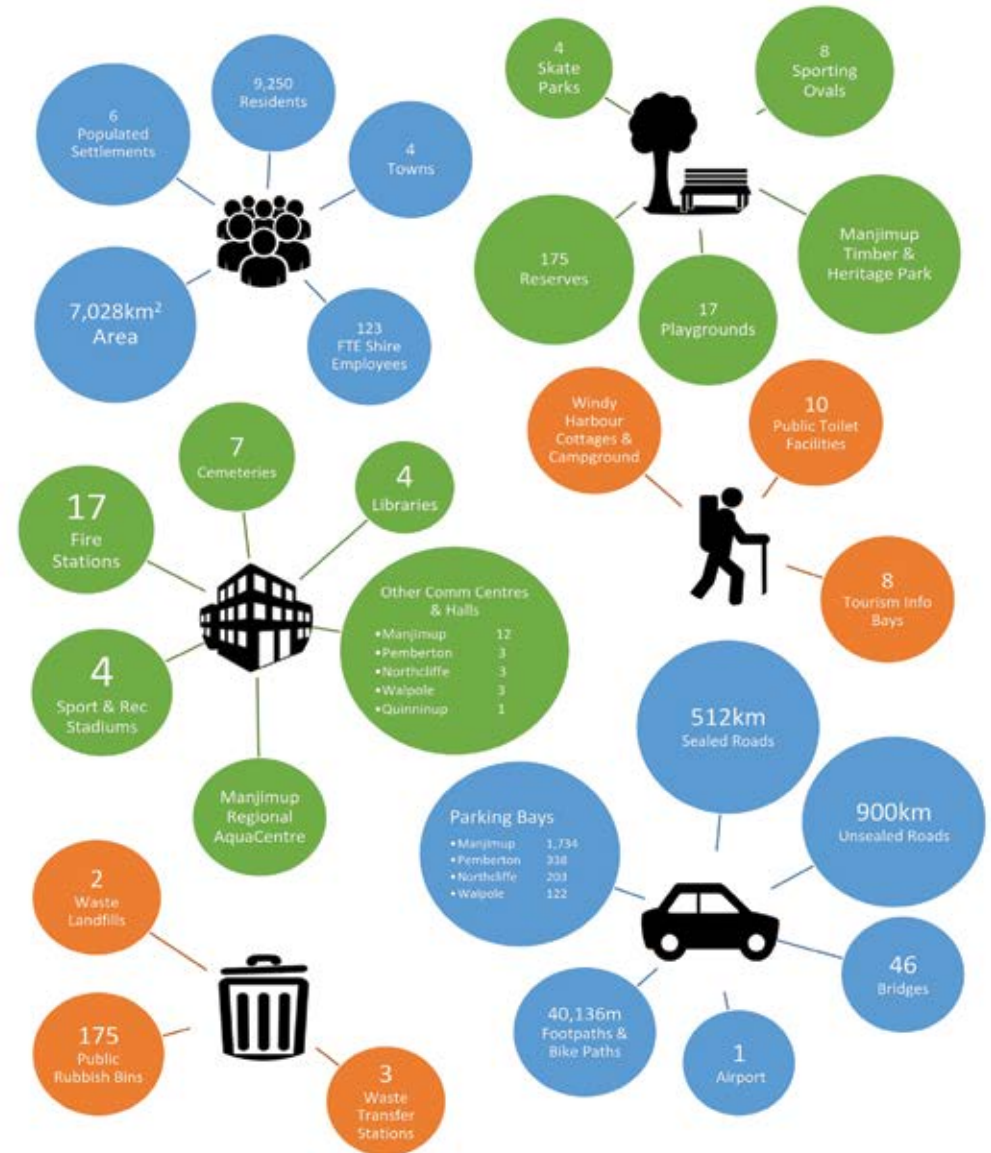
The Shire district of 7028 km² comprises of 83% national park, state forest, crown reserve and other publically managed lands. Within this large land area there is an abundance of spectacular natural attractions including more than 130 km of Southern Ocean coastline, two pristine coastal inlet systems, the extensive Yeagarup sand dunes, the majority of Western Australia’s tall forests, rivers and inland waterways including picturesque waterfalls, and scenic lookouts including two fire tree lookouts. Recreational opportunities abound in the natural landscape including many walking and cycling trails featured by the Bibbulmun and Munda Biddi Trails, fishing, marroning, wildflowers, bird watching, off road adventures and a range of other activities.

Economy

The economy of the district is very diverse and is rapidly innovating to capture market opportunity. Emerging industry investment can be found particularly in the agricultural sector with recent substantial investment in dairy, avocado, apple and truffle production driving the district's reputation as a premier "food bowl" in Western Australia. Retail investment has also been prevalent with additional significant investment on the horizon.

Total economic output for the district is estimated at \$1,380M. The major contributors to economic output are agriculture, forestry and fishing (\$381M), construction (\$125M), and other (\$672M).

Employment by sector includes agriculture, forestry and fishing (9.03%), retail trade (4.13%), health care and social assistance (4.00%), education and training (3.59%), accommodation and food services (3.10%), construction (2.86%), public administration and safety (2.29%), transport, postal and warehousing (1.79%) and administrative and support services (1.31%).

Our Heritage

The Shire's district was first included as a part of the Plantagenet Wellington and Sussex Road Districts in 1871 and later in the Nelson Road Board District. The Warren Road District was formed on 3 July 1908 and changed to the Manjimup Road District in June 1925. With the enactment of the *Local Government Act 1960*, the Manjimup Road District name was changed to Shire of Manjimup on 1 July 1961. The Shire celebrated its Centenary in 2008 having provided over 100 years of service to the district.

The Shire of Manjimup is proud of its natural and cultural heritage and works with the community to protect, enhance and interpret this. The Shire's Development and Regulation Directorate is responsible for the protection of cultural heritage through the provisions of the Local Planning Scheme. It is also responsible for the operation of the Municipal Heritage Inventory for the Shire. The Community Services Directorate supports the development of heritage interpretation in response to community and tourism needs and according to the Shire of Manjimup Heritage Connections Project Implementation Plan.

There are a number of historical societies in the Shire of Manjimup. They collect, record, classify and preserve historic records and engage with the local community and visitors in interpretation of the area's history.



Indigenous Heritage

It is estimated that the original nomadic residents of this district were the Nyungar / Murrum people dating back 30,000 years. They are the long-time custodians of the land who hold a special bond with the land and yet leave little evidence of their presence. They not only used the land as a source of food, but they managed the land to ensure the continuation of their food resources thereby working the land on a “sustainable yield” basis long before the term was coined.

For the purpose of negotiating Indigenous Land Use Agreements (ILUAs), the South West Aboriginal Land and Sea Council (SWALSC) has identified two different Noongar regions in which the Shire of Manjimup sits. The South West Boojarah region spans the Shire’s west and includes the towns of Manjimup, Pemberton and Northcliffe.

The east of the Shire, including parts of Northcliffe, Shannon and Walpole, sits within the Wagyl Kaip Southern Noongar region. A number of significant sites have been identified within both of these regions.

The Shire gains its name “Manjimup” from the indigenous “Manjin” reed, whose edible roots were highly valued, and from “up” meaning place. Originally, Manjimupp was spelt with a double “p” however this was later dropped to the singular we have today.

Migrant Heritage

The Shire of Manjimup has experienced waves of immigration since European settlement. The statistics below are based on the current population. It is worth highlighting that while residents may have been born within the Shire or elsewhere in Australia, many of them will have parents or grandparents who were born overseas.

The 2016 Census data shows that of the current Shire population:

74.6% are Australian citizens by birth

25.4% were born overseas

13.9% speak a language other than English at home

The majority of the Shire’s population was born in Australia (6,888 people). The largest population born overseas is from England (506 people). The remaining population are immigrants from many diverse countries with many diverse cultures and language groups; however, Italian and Macedonian are the most common languages spoken at home after English.

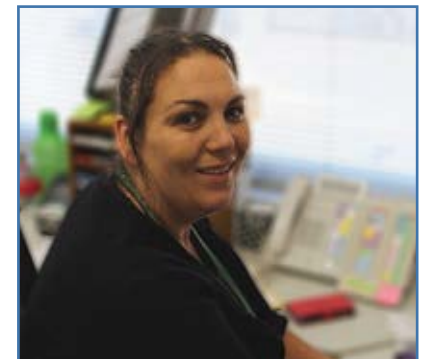

Manjimup Regional AquaCentre

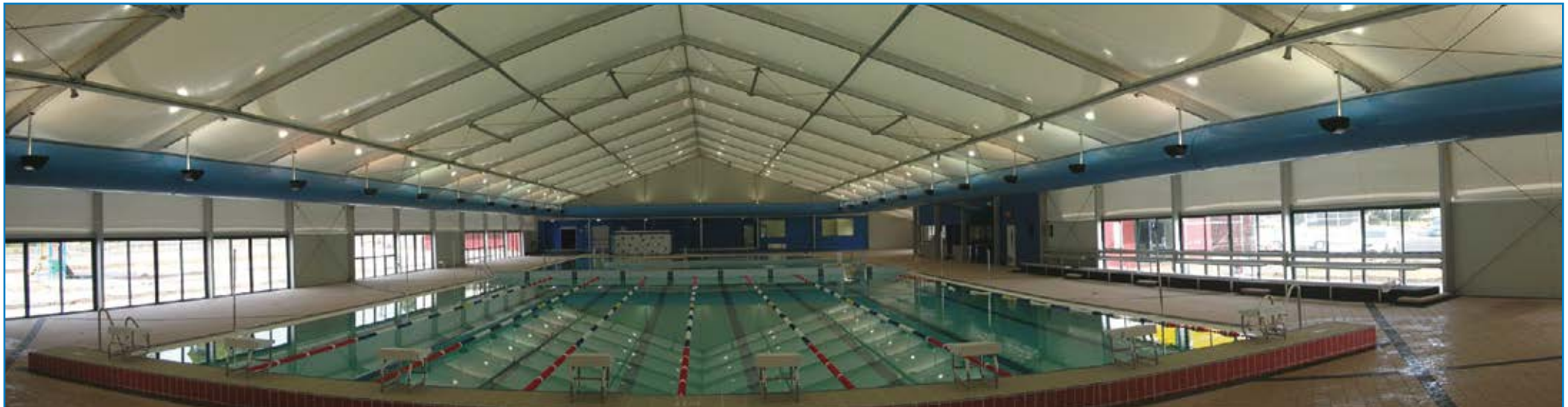

Respite wing

The Wellness Centre respite wing fills an identified gap in the provision of low and high-needs day and overnight “out of home” respite services and offers a home like environment.

The centre with its eight bed facility provides emergency or crisis respite and 24 hour respite care for ageing clients, people with disabilities and dementia care patients in the Manjimup Shire and surrounding towns.

The centre ensures that individuals are in a secure, safe, stimulating and supervised environment.

The respite wing is staffed by clinical staff when required and is accessible through private or government funding.

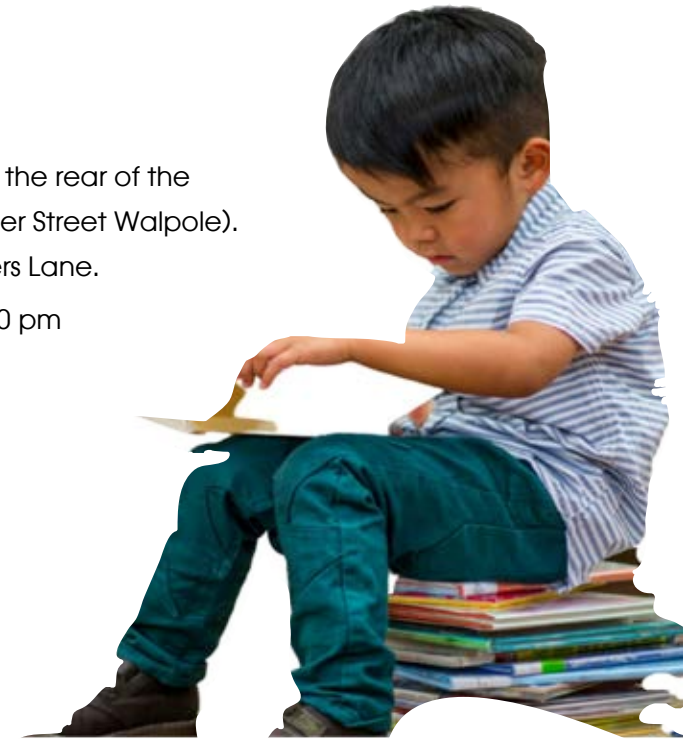
The Walpole Library is situated at the rear of the Walpole Community Centre (2 Pier Street Walpole).

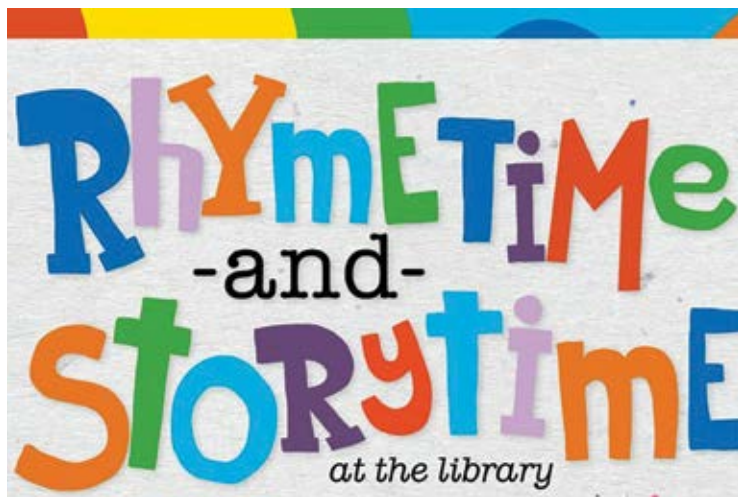

Art Gallery



The Manjimup Art Gallery is located in Manjimup alongside the public library, on the corner of Mount and Rose Streets in Manjimup. Officially opened on 1 May 2016, the Art Gallery hosts regular exhibitions and is open during the same hours as the public library.



Parks and Playgrounds

Manjimup Allambie Park

On the edge of the CBD, alongside Linear Path, Allambie Park features a natural setting, with picnic tables, walk trails and vehicle access.

Anunaka Park

A neighbourhood park featuring a playground, drinking fountain, basketball hoop, cricket pitch and picnic tables.

Apex Park

Small grassed park with picnic table on the northern entrance to town.

Cole Street Park

A small neighbourhood park featuring a playground and picnic table.

Coronation Park

Located in the centre of town on Giblett Street, Coronation Park is home to the war memorial and features a beautiful garden, lawn, picnic area and public toilets. Free WiFi available.

Lintott Park

A small neighbourhood park featuring a playground and picnic table.



Manjimup Heritage Park

The Manjimup Heritage Park provides a unique experience that combines museum and recreation activities in the same place for young and old, groups and individuals. In the heart of the park is an awe-inspiring 17m tall lookout with giant slide beside one of the best free inter-generational adventure playgrounds in Western Australia.

The recreation area boasts generous lawn space, gazebos, barbecues, tables, and plenty of shade underneath native vegetation.

Explore the Park further and discover a series of museum exhibitions and displays that tell the story of the region's history including the Age of Steam Museum and Historic Hamlet. The Historic Hamlet also contains History House which is home to the Manjimup Historical Society who collect, record, classify and preserve records relating to the history of Manjimup and the region.

Manjin Park

Manjin Park is one of the Shire's notable open, green spaces incorporating the recreation plaza, outdoor gym, children's playground, basketball halfcourt, bbq and picnic facilities.

Linear Path runs the length of the park and provides linkages to the CBD and the extensive trails leading north, south, east & west of town.

Manjin Rec Plaza

The skate park features a 3000 to 3600 high steep bank, 1.8m shallow & 2.4m deep bowl, 900mm flat bank, a variety of bars, banks, pads, rails and skateable infrastructure. It is closely linked to the CBD and encompasses a 3 on 3 basketball court, BBQ facilities, picnic area and childrens playground.

realSpaces Outdoor Gym

The gym is the first realSpaces outdoor gym in Western Australia and has a variety of cardio and strengthening equipment, a cross trainer, recumbent bike, spin bike, hand bike, lateral pull down, shoulder press, pull up, assisted pull up, leg press and bench.

Reeve Street Park

Located next to the indoor recreation centre the Northcliffe Recreation Ground features an oval, playground, drinking fountain, picnic tables, cricket pitch and public toilets.

Northcliffe Skate Park

Fun small park with a nice out / down rail, flatbar and ledge with quarterpipes and banks on each end to top it off! Also features a basketball hoop, picnic tables and shade sails in the summer.

Northcliffe Tourist Park

Located in the centre of Northcliffe, Northcliffe Tourist Park features an all ages playground, picnic tables and bbq facilities.

The RSL Park is in the centre of Pemberton, with easy access to accommodation facilities and shops. The lower end of the park hosts a children's playground. The park has beautifully maintained gardens and panoramic views of the hills and forests surrounding Pemberton.

Pemberton Skate Park

The Pemberton Skate Park is a small concrete park with flat banks, hips, pockets and a small fun box. Also features picnic tables, a drink fountain and shadesails in the summer months.

Walpole

Walpole Pioneer Park

In Walpole, along the South Western Highway, is a shady park with picnic benches, BBQ's and public toilets. You'll find the Visitor Centre in the park, and behind it is a boardwalk through the forest that makes for a pleasant and easy walk. The park showcases the peppermint trees that are a feature of the area.

Walpole Playground and Skate Park

Large unfenced playing field with football goals either end, cricket pitch, children's playground, public toilets, picnic tables, basketball hoop and shade sails. Also incorporates the concrete skate park with some tranny, fun boxes and some ledges.

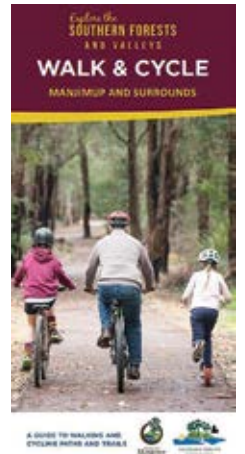

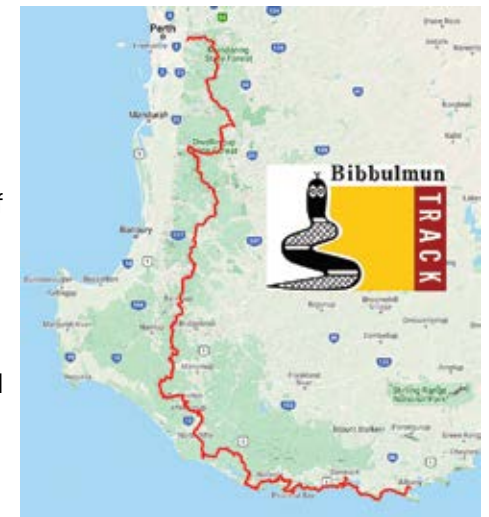


Munda Biddi Trail

At over 1,000 kms long, this long distance cycling trail links Mundaring to Albany and intersects many of the settlements and towns in the Shire of Manjimup. You can ride any section of this trail.

Bibbulmun Track

The Bibbulmun Track is one of the world's great long distance walk trails, stretching 1,000 km from Kalamunda, on the outskirts of Perth, to the historic town of Albany on the south coast. It passes through the heart of the scenic south west of Western Australia. The track is for walkers only and is signposted with yellow triangular markers symbolising the Waugal, the rainbow serpent of the Aboriginal Dreaming.

Power Up Electricity Museum

The Power Up Electricity Museum located in the iconic Manjimup Heritage Park opened to the public on 14 December 2019.

The museum showcases the history of electricity in Western Australia from the 1800s - 1900s, through modern exhibitions, engaging displays and interactive building features, providing educational and interpretative experiences for all visitors.

State Timber Museum

The unique building housing the State Timber Museum is located in the Manjimup Heritage Park.

The museum recognises the timber industry's role in Western Australia, including the shaping of the towns within the Shire of Manjimup, it is an important piece of history. The exhibition explores the history, technology and people of Western Australia's first major industry.





Steam Museum - Manjimup

The Manjimup Heritage Park, centrally located within the Manjimup town site, highlights the region's heritage. Take a step back in time inside the park's Age of Steam Museum, where you will find the restored 1907 Robey Cross Compound Engine. The museum is stacked with information on steam trains and the role they played in Manjimup's timber industry and on the walls are numerous historic photographs from the old Tone River Mill.

Northcliffe

Northcliffe Pioneer Museum

This museum has an outstanding collection of original items used by the Northcliffe group settlers more than 80 years ago, illustrating their domestic life and work on the dairy farms, on which the district of Northcliffe was founded.

The Pioneer Museum and Machinery Shed, the electric barbecue and gazebo dedicated to the Northcliffe Pioneer Women are set in the spacious picnic grounds of Jubilee Park.



Venues and Facilities for Hire from the Shire

Manjimup

Manjimup Town Hall

Located in the heart of Manjimup's CBD is our largest venue for hire, with an approximate area of 210 m². The hall is perfect for large events such as public meetings, social events and concerts. The hall has an elevated stage with change rooms, a commercial kitchen as well as a canteen/bar. Chairs and tables are available for hire. With disability access and air-conditioning, it is a comfortable venue for everyone.

Meeting Rooms 1 and 2

Meeting rooms 1 and 2, located within the Manjimup Community Centre, comprise a total area of 54 m². Two rooms are separated by a sliding partition wall to create two smaller rooms or one large area. The rooms have disability access with an external opening to a small courtyard. Ceiling fans and heaters, limited tables and chairs are supplied. These rooms are managed by the Manjimup Family Centre.

Manjimup Art Gallery

The gallery provides the opportunity for local artists to host exhibitions of their own. Discounts are available for not-for-profit community groups and registered charitable organisations.

Manjimup Regional AquaCentre

The AquaCentre is available for carnivals and celebrations.



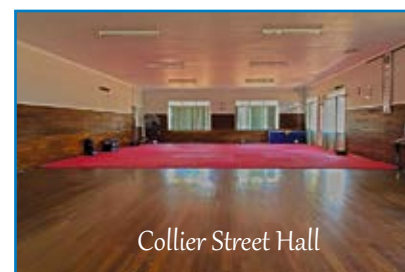

The Manjimup Collier Street complex is used frequently for sport and recreational activities. There is a kitchen and canteen/bar in the foyer, opening onto the verandah overlooking the oval. The hall has multiple external and disabled access points, a large parking area and toilets. The oval can be booked with the hall.

Manjimup Indoor Sporting Pavilion

The Manjimup Indoor Sporting Pavilion has three full size courts and is used frequently for sporting and recreational activities. The pavilion has changerooms/toilets, a kitchen, foyer and an office.

Manjimup Heritage Park Venues

Round House

The Round House is a unique mud brick building with 360 degree views over the park and town site. This venue has a basic kitchen and accessible toilets and can also be used as a temporary exhibition space.

Blacksmith Shop

Nestled in the Hamlet, the new replica Blacksmith Shop provides a functional smithing space for experienced Blacksmith's interested in practicing the trade and/or holding public demonstrations.

Agricultural Shed Exhibition Space

The Agricultural Shed is a separate, lockable exhibition space that is available for exhibitions (of any nature). The 33.5 m² space includes exhibition lighting, 4 mobile plinths and hanging rails on walls.

Sandra Donovan Sound Shell

The Sandra Donovan Sound Shell is a state of the art outdoor performance facility. This accessible, fully equipped stage provides a flexible facility for all performing arts and community events.

Power Up Electricity Museum Venues

Power Up provides a number of different spaces that can be used in isolation or together as part of a greater function or event.

Exhibition Space

The main exhibition hall provides a 600 m² space broken up with exciting museum displays. The tiered seated platform is a perfect space for presentations in a theatre-like formation. The rear wall has an 8 m wide digital projection linked to an integrated audio system and smart lighting with a range of settings. The space provides plenty of 'break-away' areas for training, workshops, conferences and forums.

Activity Room

The activity room (also known as 'The Control Room') is a 30 m² meeting space equipped with a small kitchenette, tables and chairs. Ideal for small meetings or break-away discussions from larger events.

Foyer

This large 160 m² foyer provides direct access to the toilets, café and museum. The space has some ottoman type seating, smart lighting with a range of settings and moveable exhibition displays.

Wellness and Respite Community Centre Venues

Conference Room

A light and contemporary space which accommodates up to 150 guests, equipped with a high quality projector and large screen, chairs, tables and tea/coffee facilities.

Meeting Room

A functional boardroom style space for up to 20 people. The room is equipped with a large meeting table, comfortable chairs, video conferencing facilities and tea/coffee making facilities.

Therapy Room

A private room suitable for small meetings, one on one consultations and small group therapy sessions.

Community Room

A modern, light and functional community space suitable for up to 30 people, equipped with tables, chairs, tea and coffee making facilities and a large screen TV.

Commercial Kitchen

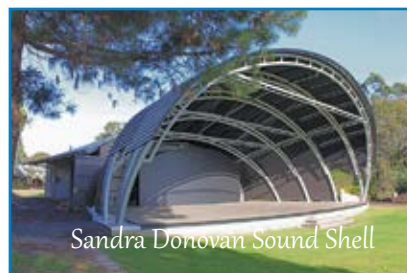

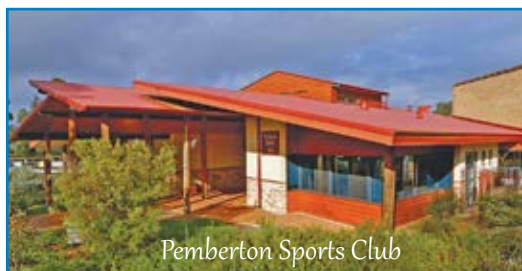

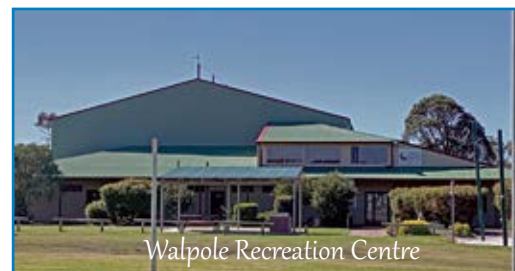

Sports Grounds

Alcohol and other drugs

The Shire of Manjimup takes alcohol and other drugs very seriously, as we know it can affect communities in devastating ways. Since 2012 the Shire of Manjimup has been a key partner in the Southern Forests Alcohol and Other Drug Project which aims to prevent alcohol and other drug related harm across the community.

Club development

Healthy, sustainable clubs have a clear understanding of their rules, leadership, goals and performance while maintaining a strong member focus.

The Community Services Team aims to assist in building capacity in our sporting clubs and community groups to ensure they remain sustainable.

The team can help with understanding the constitution, developing a strategic plan, defining roles and responsibilities of committee members, how to run meetings and many other issues clubs may need assistance with.

Community safety

The Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan (CS&CP) is a community document for which the Shire of Manjimup acts as a custodian. The Plan mentions key concerns and issues regarding safety and crime prevention identified by the community, law enforcement and other stakeholder organisations. The plan provides strategies to help guide the Shire and the community in appropriate crime prevention actions. The plan is reviewed every five years facilitated by the Shire and informed by the community.

Community grants

Every year the Shire of Manjimup reserves 2.5% of the prior year's rates revenue and gives it back to the community in the form of grants. There are four categories of community grants; general community groups and projects, financial hardship, youth and events. The Community Funds Advisory Committee assesses each application and makes recommendations to Council for budget deliberations, when grants funds are allocated to projects and events that they deem to have merit.

Community transport

The community bus is a 2012 Mitsubishi Fuso Rosa. It seats 24 people, including the driver, and is owned and operated by the Shire.

Whilst priority is given to the core groups, being seniors (55+), youth (under 25) and disabled groups, other community groups may hire the bus. The vehicle is available for private hire at the discretion of the Shire of Manjimup, if no commercial vehicles are available.



Early years

The early years refers to children aged 0-8 years old. It also includes parents, families, care givers and community groups in which children and their families are involved, as well as service and program providers aimed at this age group.

The Shire of Manjimup is committed to providing support to families and communities to ensure young children are given the best possible chance to learn, develop and achieve good mental and physical health. To achieve this vision, the Shire, in partnership with the Warren Blackwood Early Years Network, has developed an Early Years Strategic Plan. This plan provides the framework to improve the health and wellbeing of the youngest members of our community.

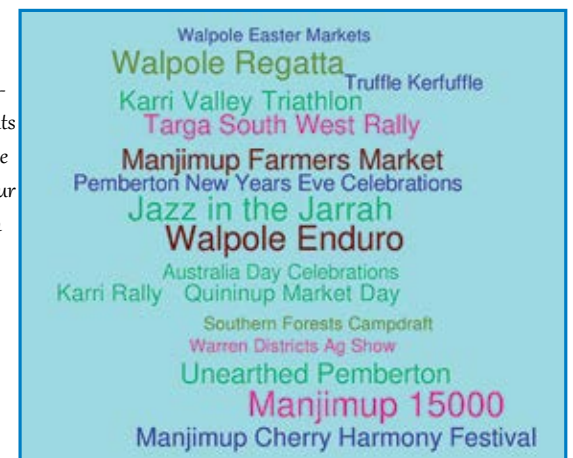

The Event Policy provides event organisers with processes and procedures surrounding events to ensure that legislative requirements, the amenity of surrounding residents and patron safety are all upheld.

Some of our major annual events include:

▼ Truffle Kerfuffle

The Truffle Kerfuffle is a foodie festival held in June every year celebrating one of the world's most luxurious ingredients, fresh black truffles. The festival is an all weekend celebration held in the grounds of the picturesque and historic Fonty's Pool and attracts renowned chefs and food icons.



▲ Manjimup Cherry Harmony Festival

Held annually in mid December the Cherry Harmony Festival has become a must do on the calendar and provides a variety of events, entertainment, competitions and guests. Thousands of people have descended on the town for the Cherry Harmony Festival and popular and renowned "Long Table Lunch".

▼ Manjimup 15,000 Motorcross

The Manjimup 15,000 motocross occurs on the WA Day long weekend in June every year.

This fast paced event is held at the spectacular Cosy Creek Track. The impressive prize money attracts State, National and International riders.



▼ Unearthed Pemberton

The Unearthed Festival showcases the beauty and diversity of the Southern Forests through its food and wine, art, heritage and of course nature-based adventure. The organisers continue to add new and interesting events, tours and experiences that highlight just how diverse and exciting our region is.



◀ Blooming Wild Festival

Blooming Wild - Southern Forest & Valleys promotes tourism experiences and wildflowers in the South West during Spring. Peak season September to November.

▶ Karri Cup

One of Western Australia's largest and longest running mountain bike events. The Karri Cup is held in the Southern Forests around the lower south west town of Northcliffe.



◀ Targa South West

Targa South West is a unique motorsport event that brings all the action to you. Unlike traditional motorsport, where you have to go to a race track to watch, competitors in the Make Smoking History Targa South West come to Manjimup, Pemberton and Northcliffe to compete on the roads in and around the towns.

Development and Regulation

Planning and Development

Development applications

Development approval (DA) is required for a range of developments and land uses within the Shire.

The Shire's Local Planning Scheme No. 4 (LPS4) outlines what land uses are permitted in a given zone. The LPS4 also provides a range of development standards and requirements that a development needs to comply with.

The development application process is the mechanism used to ensure these requirements are met.

It is important to note that a development application is a different process to a building permit or health approval. Obtaining a development approval does not exempt you from also obtaining a building permit or other required approvals.

Building Services

The Shire is committed to providing information and assistance to owners and builders for safe and compliant buildings that will last and have minimum impact on neighbouring properties and the environment.

In Western Australia, building legislation is governed by the *Building Act 2011* and the *Building Regulations 2012*. The Act and the Regulations define what is building work and stipulate when a building permit is required and the process for obtaining a building permit.

The minimum standards required for all construction in Western Australia are set out in the Building Code of Australia (BCA) and the associated Australian Standards. All building applications must demonstrate compliance with the BCA.



The Development Control Unit (DCU) consists of staff members from planning, building, health and emergency services. They meet weekly to discuss development applications.

Environmental Health

“Have you considered the impacts on people?”

This is the question at the forefront of Environmental Health. The Shire’s Environmental Health Services team answers this question on your behalf, aiming to keep the Shire free of the environmental health impacts that may occur when the public are exposed to hazardous substances and environments. Environmental health studies show how the environment (air, water, soil, physical, chemical, biological and social) influences impact human health.

Environmental health services include the regulation of food safety, accommodation premises, water (drinking, waste and recreational), noise, pollution, nuisances, event safety, street trading, public building safety, offensive trades, infectious diseases, sanitation and more.

Health officer roles are governed by numerous acts, regulations, laws and guidelines including, but not limited to, the *Food Act*, *Environmental Protection Act*, *Caravan Parks and Camping Grounds Act*, *Public Health Act* and subsidiary legislation including regulations for aquatic centres, noise, food, asbestos, offensive trades, public buildings, skin penetration premises and treatment of sewage, effluent and waste water.

Noise

The Shire of Manjimup will respond to most forms of noise complaints.

For complaints relating to parties or where anti-social behaviour is likely please contact the police.

You can download a noise complaint form on our website.

Roosters

The Shire’s local laws do not allow the keeping of roosters with townsites, for complaints in relation to crowing roosters please submit a written complaint detailing how the rooster is affecting your amenity.

FoodSafe - Online training

FoodSafe online food handler training is a free interactive food handler training program available to all food businesses, community groups and residents within the Shire of Manjimup. The program is fully online with training videos and questions and a certificate is issued upon completion of the course. Visit our website for information.

Water testing

Environmental Health Officers’ can undertake testing of your water for microbiological parameters.

Sampling of public swimming pools is carried out monthly and recreational water sources are sampled throughout the summer months with samples sent to PathWest Water Laboratory to be tested for bacteria and Amoeba.



Ranger Services

Ranger Services respond to many community concerns and complaints regarding fire, straying stock, parking, littering, dogs, cats and illegal dumping.

The rangers maintain and enforce various legislation, regulations and local laws relating to animals, fire control and parking.

Cats and Dogs

The *Cat Act 2011* and the *Dog Act 1976* legislates the ownership of cats and dogs in Western Australia and encourages responsible pet ownership.

Cats over the age of 6 months and dogs over the age of 3 months must be:

- micro-chipped and wearing a collar and registration tags;
- registered – with the Local Government;
- cats should be sterilised – unless being used for breeding purposes by an approved breeder;
- in addition, you should seriously consider having your dog sterilised.

Rangers are authorised to enforce this legislation and fines may apply to owners who do not comply.

Cat Local Law

The purpose of the Cat Local Law is to provide for the management of cats throughout the Shire of Manjimup.

The effect of the local law is to promote responsible cat ownership and manage the control of cats within the Shire of Manjimup.

Registration

Registrations are due on the first of November each year and are current for either one or three years or the life of the pet. Registration helps you to recover your pet if lost and assists the Shire to encourage responsible pet ownership.

Nuisance cats and dogs

If you live near a dog or cat that is causing a nuisance, you should approach the owner if you feel it is safe to do so. If you feel the owner is unapproachable or the issue is not resolved, please contact us to report the nuisance to Ranger Services.

Wandering dogs

As a dog owner you **MUST** make sure that your dog is not able to wander off your property. A condition of registration is that all dogs be wholly confined within their premises. Wandering dogs may be impounded and the owner fined. Penalties may be incurred. If your dog causes damage, or injuries to a person or another animal while it is wandering, you may be liable for the damage.

Dogs are not permitted in playground areas.

Cat Prohibited Areas

We have 33 cat prohibited areas within the Shire of Manjimup, this means no cats are permitted in these areas at any time.

This has been put in place for the protection of wildlife and to stop the possibility of cats creating a nuisance.

Fuel hazard reduction on private property is the responsibility of the land owner.

A Fire Break and Fuel Hazard Reduction Notice is mailed to all landowners annually and outlines the requirements for your property.

Restricted and prohibited burning periods are applicable from November to April, please check the website or facebook page for specific dates for your zone.

Are you bushfire prepared?

Getting ready for bushfire season is everyone's responsibility. Our volunteers in the bushfire brigades, Fire & Rescue Service and State Emergency Service as well as the Shire's own staff, Department of Fire & Emergency Services and Department of Parks & Wildlife all do a remarkable job to keep us safe. Getting your own property ready will assist them in the event of an emergency.

So what should I do?

First and foremost, comply with the Firebreak and Fuel Hazard Reduction Notice.

Do not rely on scheme water during a bushfire, download the Water Corporation bushfire information flyer from the Water Corporation website.

Works and Services

The Shire of Manjimup's Works and Infrastructure Services consist of **Parks Operations**, **Technical Services** and **Works** and together these teams deliver essential infrastructure services to the residents, visitors and investors utilising our roads, parks, footpaths and public spaces.

Airfield

The Manjimup Airfield is owned and managed by the Shire of Manjimup. It caters for various aviation services such as the Royal Flying Doctor, emergency fire fighting operations, private aircraft, as well as being the home of the Manjimup Aero Club.



Drainage

The Shire maintains a drainage network designed to prevent flooding of roads and property. As part of this maintenance, sweeping of roads and cleaning of gullies/table drains is undertaken on a scheduled basis, to reduce build up of leaf litter and other rubbish in the drains.

Footpaths

The Shire constructs footpaths on a priority basis. This is determined through the consideration of a number of criteria, including the distance from schools, shops and recreation centres, traffic volumes and housing density. We have a scheduled footpath inspection and maintenance program.



School bus stops

The local school bus service is managed by the Public Transport Authority (PTA). However, the Shire's Technical Services department assists the PTA by assessing new school bus stop applications.

State Government roads

The following main highways in the Shire of Manjimup are the responsibility of Main Roads WA:

- South Western Highway, Vasse Highway, Muir Highway,
- South Coast Highway and Pemberton-Northcliffe Road.

Road maintenance and repairs

Each year the Shire spends approximately \$2,000,000 on providing maintenance to the Shire's vast road network comprising 512kms of sealed roads and over 800kms of unsealed roads. Most maintenance works are provided on a programmed basis, including:

- Road sweeping
- Grading of gravel roads
- Installing guide posts
- Patching of potholes
- Shoulder improvement works
- Weed control

In addition to these maintenance services the Shire also undertakes works on an emergency basis, including:

- Removal of fallen trees
- Road failure
- Flooding/stormwater washouts
- Dangerous tree removal



Signage

Directional signage

The purpose of directional signage on public road reserves is to provide directional assistance only, not advertising.

Street signs

The Shire maintains street name signs, both urban and rural, parking signs and 'No Through Road' signs.

Variable message sign (VMS)

The Shire has a portable VMS board that can be temporarily displayed on a road reserve. Local community groups may apply to the Shire in writing to display an upcoming local event.



Rural street numbering

Rural addressing is a simple, straight-forward means to identify, locate and address properties in rural areas.

It is vitally important that properties be numbered in a consistent and logical way to assist emergency services.

Each individual rural property (with a dwelling) is assigned a unique number based on the distance of the property entrance from the designated starting point of the road or an intersection.



Road closures

Road closures are processed in accordance with *Section 58* of the *Land Administration Act 1997 (LAA)*.

All road closures require a written request.

Permanant closure occurs when an adjoining landowner wishes to close and subsequently amalgamate a road reserve into their existing property.

Temporary closure (up to 4 years) is used to close a road that may be required in the future but can be closed for the interim period.

Temporary closure for an event is used for a temporary short term closure for the period of a public event.

Traffic management

The Shire provides support for community events that take place on roads within the Shire.

In accordance with Main Roads WA stipulations, the Shire provides temporary traffic management to either close a section of road or over-rule the *Road Traffic Act* in order to enable the safe passage of vehicles through or around the event by speed reduction signage and traffic controllers.



Parks and gardens

The Shire's parks team are dedicated to the maintenance and upkeep of our parks, reserves and streetscapes. They cover a range of areas from sports grounds and children's playgrounds, to bushland conservation, pocket parks and paths and trails.

Maintenance

Maintenance and service levels are varied depending on the reserve site, but generally include:

- Mowing and fertilising turf areas within parks or active grounds
- Planting and maintenance of soft planted landscaped areas
- Rehabilitation planting within bushland and coastal foreshore reserves in accordance with adopted management plans
- Maintenance of play equipment and environments
- Maintenance of site furniture, including picnic facilities, seating, bike racks and drink fountains
- Fencing
- Skate and BMX facilities
- Irrigation of parks and reserves

Weed maintenance

Weed control is important to ensure we are all free to use and enjoy our parks, reserves and green spaces.

Weed control ensures the public can safely access the area by preventing infestations, preventing weeds becoming a trip hazard, ensuring pathways are clear, and reducing fire loads. It also minimises damage to infrastructure and improves biodiversity.

Trees and vegetation

Removal of road reserve vegetation

Requests to remove vegetation within a Shire road reserve for the purpose of installing a new fence, creating crossovers, creating road access etc, must be assessed by a Technical Services Officer in accordance with Council policies Road Reserve Vegetation Management and Road Hierarchy.

Verge trees

The Shire has a scheduled annual verge tree pruning program. Trees may be pruned when they are nearing power lines or where branches overhang the road or footpaths. Western Power takes responsibility for the pruning of naturally occurring verge trees under power lines.

Residents are permitted to carry out light under pruning and/or side pruning of their verge trees for the following reasons:

vision problems; removal of broken branches, trimming of branches over fence lines or footpaths, for aesthetic purposes and when trees are nearing power lines.

Dangerous trees

If you identify any tree/s you consider to be a danger to the road user, you need to contact the Shire.

Trees that are considered to pose a risk to private property must be assessed by a suitably trained/experienced Shire Officer or contractor who, in accordance with the above policy, may then issue a permit for removal.

Property Care Team

The Shire of Manjimup is a registered Australian Disability Enterprise, being one of only eight in Western Australia.

The Property Care Team is made up of six workers and one coordinator. All employees are qualified white card holders, have extensive training in all facets of their roles and are very friendly and willing to help.

The Shire of Manjimup's Property Care Team provides assistance to the teams within the Works and Services Directorate and are also available to assist members of the public and local businesses and organisations with general garden or horticultural tasks, such as:

- Mowing
- Mulching
- Picking (crops)
- Pruning
- Rubbish removal
- Whipper snipping
- Weed control
- Yard maintenance & clean-up
- Other duties - make an enquiry!

Waste Management

Kerbside Collection

Domestic collection

Domestic collection is the weekly kerbside collection of domestic rubbish using 240L or 140L mobile garbage bins (MGBs) or 'wheelie' bins.

The Shire has prescribed areas in Council Policy 9.2.2 Waste Collection. Manjimup, Pemberton, Northcliffe and Walpole townsites and Deanmill, Quinninup, Palgarup and Jardee settlements and various rural subdivisions.

Collection times

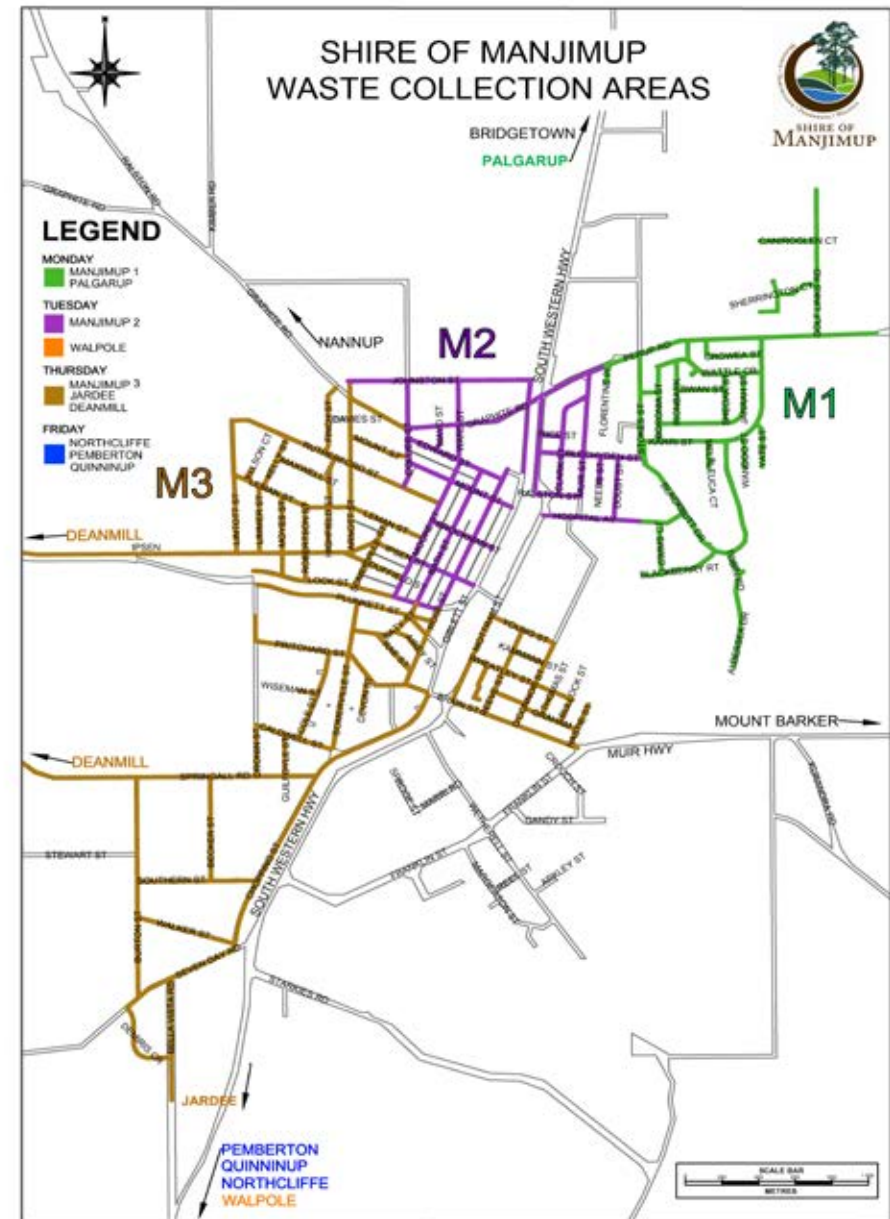
All services to any individual property will generally be provided on the same day of the week between the hours of 7am and 5pm, except where varied by Council in exceptional circumstances.

Bin collection criteria

The collection service will only collect the contents of the supplied bin. The maximum weight of the bin placed out for collection must not be more than 70kg. The service will not collect any rubbish placed around or on top of the bins. Bins that are too heavy, have protruding waste or are over compacted will not be collected until the bin is compliant. An explanation notice will be attached to bins that are not collected.

Damaged or stolen bins

Domestic recycling bins are the property of the Shire and rubbish bins are the property of the Shire's contractor. Bins are provided to the property and are not to be removed when the property is vacated or sold. Bins will be replaced at no cost to the customer if no longer useable due to normal wear and tear. If a bin is stolen or damaged, please notify the Shire of Manjimup. In accordance with the Shire of Manjimup Waste Collection Policy, property owners are required to pay for bin repair or replacement in most cases.



Recycling

Recycling bins are emptied once a fortnight on the same day of the week as the weekly domestic waste collection. Where a regular collection day falls on a public holiday, all services will continue on the same day as normal unless otherwise advised. It is the occupier's responsibility to remove bins from the kerbside within 12 hours of being emptied.

A recycling calendar for the current year is included with this booklet.



Hastie Waste operate a containers for change refund point at 5 Margerison Street Manjimup. A mobile drop off visits Pemberton on Wednesdays.



Mobile phones and most printer cartridges can be recycled at your nearest library or CRC, electronics and old televisions can be taken to waste disposal sites free of charge.



Hand held batteries can be recycled at your nearest library or CRC.

Green waste

Studies show that, on average, almost 40% of the home waste bin is organic material (food, paper and garden scraps) that could be composted. 20% of the total volume of waste deposited at the Ralston Road Refuse and Recycling Centre is green waste - in most years more than 7,000 cubic metres is disposed. Home composting or worm farming has the potential to save our community large amounts of money used in the transport, disposal and processing of rubbish.

Composting and worm farms

Compost and worm castings not only feed plants, but condition the soil by nurturing microbe presence and health, increasing the soil's water and nutrient holding capacity and reducing the levels of soil borne plant pathogens and pests. A balanced natural soil produces healthy plants that have a natural resistance to disease and insect pests. Healthy plants produce more nutritious healthy produce. Worm farms are an ideal way to reduce food waste being disposed of and allows people to become actively involved in recycling.

They can provide an enjoyable hobby for both adults and children. The main material produced by earthworms as they eat their way through kitchen scraps is called castings. It is highly nutritious and cheap fertiliser for plants. The added bonus is the production of a worm liquid sometimes referred to as "Worm Wee". This liquid diluted with water, applied to plants can achieve some remarkable healthy plant growth.

Compost bins and worm farms are available to purchase from the Shire.



Asbestos

The Manjimup Refuse Site, located on Ralston Road, Manjimup is the only facility in the Shire of Manjimup that is licensed to accept asbestos waste. Contact needs to be made in advance with the facility to make a booking if the load cannot be unloaded by hand. The volume of the waste will be calculated at the time and the tipping fee levied. You will be required to fill out an asbestos disposal form prior to unloading.

Any asbestos presented at that site for disposal must be:

- Wrapped in builder's construction grade plastic, taped and placed on a pallet.
- Smaller quantities that can be unloaded safely by one person, without possible damage, do not need to be on a pallet.
- In the case of asbestos from a building fire, asbestos pieces mixed with rubble can be placed in a bulk fertiliser bag.
- Clearly labelled as asbestos with lettering at least 50mm high.
- Loads that have split or damaged wrapping, are not taped, or have exposed asbestos will not be accepted.

Hard Waste Collection

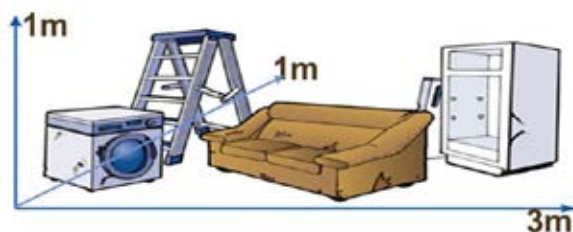
The Shire of Manjimup provide an annual vergeside hard waste collection to residential properties which receive a regular kerbside bin collection.

Hard waste is defined as furniture and other household goods.

This is a free service provided to residents who receive a weekly bin collection.

A total of 3 cubic metres (1m x 1m x 3m) may be collected per property.

Kerbside hard waste collection occurs in May each year, exact dates are advertised prior to the collection, along with an explanation of which items will or will not be collected.



The service will not collect;

- green waste (lawn clippings, limbs, etc)
- hazardous material, gas cylinders, asbestos
- general domestic waste (food scraps, etc)
- liquid waste (oils, paints, poisons, etc)
- building materials (cement, bricks, rubble, etc)
- commercial crates (milk/bread pallets, shopping trolleys, etc)
- items longer than two metres
- tyres

Waste Facilities

The Shire has one landfill site and three transfer stations.

Meetings

Council meetings are held on a three weekly rotation at 5.30pm on Thursday.

Meetings are held in the Council Chambers, Brockman Street, Manjimup, with one meeting per year held in Pemberton, Northcliffe and Walpole.

Agendas and minutes

Agendas are available online by the Tuesday preceding the meeting and

minutes are available by the Tuesday following.

Attendance

The public is welcome to attend council meetings.

Under meeting procedure determined by the Shire of Manjimup Standing Orders Local Law 2013, at the commencement of the meeting, members of the public may ask up to a maximum of two questions of Council. There is no further opportunity to question the Shire of Manjimup during the meeting. Questions can be asked on any Shire matter, not just on issues included in the meeting agenda and each person shall have up to three minutes to ask their questions which may be extended by an additional three minutes where considered appropriate by the Presiding Member. Persons asking questions are entitled to a response unless the question is declared “out of order” by the Presiding Member. If a matter requires further investigation, that response may be in writing. Any person asking questions of Council must state their correct name and address as this will form part of the public record of this meeting.

Committees of Council

There are a number of Shire of Manjimup Committees of which both councillors, staff, other organisations and members of the public may be a member.

Our committees represent a key consultative and decision making opportunity for community members to participate in the broader decision making processes of local government.

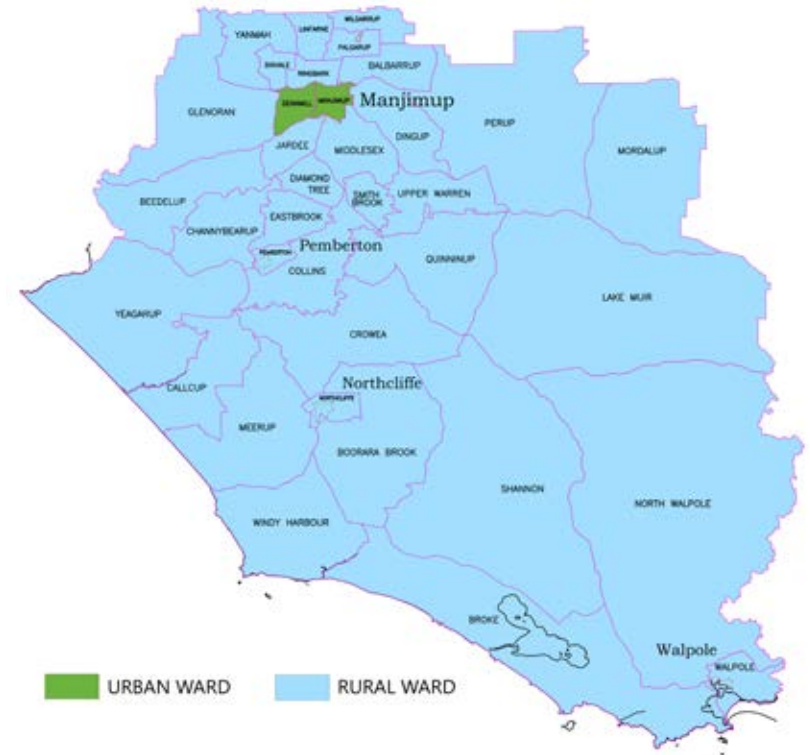

Elections are held for half the seats every two years.



Wards

As a result of State Government Reforms, there are major changes occurring to the electoral boundaries in the Shire in 2023. Currently the Shire of Manjimup is divided into six wards. Prior to the 2023 election the Shire will be changing to a two ward system, with an Urban Ward and a Rural Ward. Each ward is its own electorate, with councillor representation of at least 10% of electors per councillor.

Who is my representative?

A councillor contact sheet is included with this booklet. Alternatively you can find your representative on the Shire website.

Rates

Raising of rates

The raising of rates is governed by statutory guidelines in the *Local Government Act 1995*. Rate notices are sent in approximately mid-August of each year and are due 35 days from the issue of the notice. Rates can be paid in full by the due date or in four equal instalments.

Rates are calculated by multiplying the UV or GRV rate in the dollar by the property's Unimproved Valuation (UV) or Gross Rental Valuation (GRV).

Generally, the valuation on the property will be based on its use; UV for rural use and GRV for non-rural use. This valuation is provided by the Valuer-General, via Landgate.

The Valuer-General revalues UVs every year and GRVs every six years. If you believe the UV or GRV on your property is too high, you may submit an objection to valuation form. You must submit your objection within 60 days of the issue of the rate notice.

Late payment penalty of 7% per annum

This will accrue daily for unpaid amounts as below:

- No instalment option taken – interest shall begin to accrue on rates and/or service charges that remain unpaid after the due date on the notice and continue to accrue until the balance is paid. Eligible pensioners are exempt.
- Instalment option taken – interest shall begin to accrue daily on any instalment payment that remains unpaid after the due date and continue to accrue until paid. Eligible pensioners are exempt.

Recovery of overdue rates and charges

Where no election has been made to pay by instalments, or alternative arrangements made, a final notice is issued for overdue rate notices. If the rates and service charges still remain unpaid with no special payment arrangement in place, legal action may be started for their recovery, without further notice. Costs associated with legal action are recoverable from the ratepayer and will be added to the account.

Pensioners and concession card holders

If you have a valid concession card you could qualify for a rebate or a deferment on paying your rates. You may also be eligible for rebates on your water bill from the Water Corporation.

To qualify, ratepayers must meet all the following criteria:

- You must be the owner and occupier of the property at 1 July of the financial year being claimed; and
- You must hold a valid Pensioner Concession Card, State Concession Card, WA Seniors Card or both a WA Seniors Card and Commonwealth Seniors Health Card.

To receive your rebate, you must pay your share of the rates and charges by 30 June each year. If you do not pay your rates, you may be eligible to defer the full amount.
